Register to Receive Emergency CodeRED Alerts



University City is pleased to announce CodeRED, a new high-speed, web-based mass emergency notification system. The system gives University City Public Safety the ability to push text notifications and send telephone messages to share critical communications throughout the City or specific targeted areas when there is an emergency situation that requires immediate action.

Examples include automated CodeRED weather warnings that can be launched just moments after a bulletin has been issued by the National Weather Service for severe thunderstorms, flash floods, tornadoes and winter storms. Available since 1998, CodeRED is being used by more than 3,000 state and local government entities across the United States and Canada.

In addition to severe weather situations, CodeRED can be used to issue alerts about drinking water contamination, utility outages, evacuation notices and routes, street closures, missing persons, fires or floods, bomb threats, chemical spills, gas leaks, and more.

Greetings U City Neighbors

I am excited to be reporting to University City residents that our CodeRED Early Warning System will soon be operational. CodeRED will allow our residents to receive early warnings for emergency situations, such as evacuation notices, missing persons and inclement weather advisories, as well as boil water notices, gas leaks, police activity, fire emergencies and more.

Messages will be sent out via phone, text, email and social media. CodeRED will also alert our community when there is a potential tornado or extreme rainfall that could lead to flooding in certain areas.

In addition, University City’s Commission on Storm Water Issues has been working diligently on an early warning flood system that will be directly tied into the CodeRED system. This system will have the ability to keep our emergency workers up-to-date with minute-by-minute high-water alerts for all of the waterways throughout University City. With this information readily available, residents will receive a 30-minute advance warning of a potential flood situation, which would allow time to seek safety and prepare for extreme scenarios.

I encourage all residents to sign up for the CodeRED Early Warning System. There is no charge for this service.

City Manager Gregory Rose recently announced key staff promotions and appointments. In addition to promoting Brooke Smith to Deputy City Manager and naming John Wagner to Acting Director of Planning and Development, new appointments included Dawn Beasley as Assistant City Manager and Amy Williams as Director of Human Resources.

Brooke Smith, Esq., joined the City as Assistant City Manager in May 2021. Her responsibilities include housing, infrastructure and development projects. Prior to joining the City, she served as City Manager of East St. Louis. Ms. Smith earned her Master's in Public Affairs from the University of Missouri, Columbia, Juris Doctor from St. Louis University School of Law, and Bachelor of Science in Psychology from Lindenwood University in St. Charles. She is a member of the Missouri Bar Association, International City/County Management Association and National Forum for Black Public Administrators.

Dawn Beasley was appointed Assistant City Manager in February 2022. She brings to the City 11 years of experience in the not-for-profit field as a human resource professional, including senior management, organizational strategy, and leadership coaching responsibilities. As Assistant City Manager, she is involved in administering City projects, programs and activities, as well as conducting research and analysis necessary to make recommendations to the City Manager regarding potential improvements to business practices and procedures. Ms. Beasley also supervises the Technology, Print Center, and Communications divisions. She earned both her MBA and Bachelor of Science in Human Resources from Lindenwood University. She is a member of the International City-County Management Association (ICMA), Missouri City-County Management Association (MCMA), and the St. Louis Area City Management Association (SLACMA).

Amy Williams, joined the City in February 2022 as Director of Human Resources. A former St. Louis County police officer and law school graduate, she also has more than five years of operations, project management, executive leadership and administration experience in the public service sector. As Director of Human Resources, she directs and supervises operations of all human resources functional areas for more than 250 full-time and 40 part-time City employees, as well as manages labor relations issues and serves as the liaison for the Civil Service Board in addition to other duties. Ms. Williams earned her Juris Doctor from the University of the District of Columbia, David A. Clarke School of Law, and her Bachelor of Science in Psychology and Criminal Justice from Culver-Stockton College.

John Wagner, Ph.D., was appointed Acting Director of Planning and Development in February 2022, after serving as Senior Planner since November 2021. An experienced economic development professional, his background includes serving as Postdoctoral Teaching Fellow in the Political Science Department of Washington University, Research and Analytics Officer for the Missouri Foundation for Health, Director of the Bi-State Development Research Institute, Project Manager of Economic Development for Bi-State, and as Community Policy Director for FOCUS St. Louis, in addition to leadership positions. Dr. Wagner earned his Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Public Policy Analysis from St. Louis University, Masters in Urban Planning from the University of Kansas, and Bachelors in Wildlife Science from Purdue University.

ADMISSION

Admission is limited to any individual (age 3+) with a Centennial Commons membership, Heman Park Pool season pass, resident or non-resident ID card. Cards are not required for babies and children under 3 years of age. Memberships, passes and ID cards may be purchased at Centennial Commons Control Desk (see hours below) and are available to both residents and non-residents.

To access the pool at resident rates, residents must obtain a resident recreation ID card (\$5.00/person) and pay the daily admission fee. Residents must present either a membership card, season pass or recreation ID for entry.

To obtain a resident recreation ID card, residents must present their University City – issued occupancy permit as proof of residency and pay a \$5.00 fee.

There are NO EXCEPTIONS

Occupancy permits are available at City Hall, 6801 Delmar, 4th floor, Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.

Please Note: To be added to a Centennial Commons family membership, please ensure your University City occupancy permit has been updated to include all immediate family members who reside in your home.

To access the facility, non-residents are required to have a non-resident recreation ID card (\$7.00/person) and pay the daily admission fee or hold a membership/season pass.

Individuals who cannot provide proof of residency with a University City issued occupancy permit may purchase a non-resident recreation ID card, which costs \$7.00/person. To access the facility, non-residents must show their ID card and pay the daily admission fee.

REMINDER

Current members of Centennial Commons are also members of Heman Park Pool.

Youth ages 12 and under **MUST** be accompanied by a parent/authorized guardian/ caregiver who is 18 years or older and remains with the youth throughout the entire swim session.

Stormwater Progress

The Stormwater Commission is continuing to develop a Flood Warning System and is working with the City on possible public notification protocols. One promising possibility is the CodeRED System

Flood Watch vs. Flood Warning

It's important to know the difference between a Flood Watch and a Flood Warning. A Flood Watch means flooding is possible and you should be prepared. A Flood Warning means do not attempt to travel because some roads WILL be flooded. Just six inches of moving water can sweep you off your feet; two feet of moving water can sweep a car off the roadway. If you see flooded areas -- turn around! Stay safe!





Summer Crime Initiative

The University City Police Department (UCPD) will be conducting a Summer Crime Initiative to ensure the safety of our citizens and visitors. Proactive steps will include the Uniform Patrol Division, Special Response Unit, Bureau of Investigations, Public Information Office and Parking Enforcement Unit. In addition to officers from the UCPD, we will work in conjunction with other law enforcement partners around our area.

With most school districts closed for the summer, there is a potential for an increase in juvenile crime, traffic related situations and gang issues. The police department will work to combat any rise in crimes against persons and property. The listed units will conduct on-going operations targeting the following areas of concern:

- Juvenile offenses including curfew violations
- Burglaries including auto and home
- Unauthorized use of motor vehicle(s)
- Graffiti
- Gang related crimes
- Traffic related offenses
- Parole and probation checks
- Sex offender checks

The UCPD will work with local media via the Public Information Office to announce our initiatives and efforts to keep all citizens safe, utilizing print, television and social media to ensure citizen awareness of the department's efforts, as well as public service projects that will be available.

Uniform Patrol Division

The Uniform Patrol Division, which includes the Traffic Unit, also will be pro-active during this initiative with patrol supervisors capturing data and statistics to assist in allocating resources efficiently and effectively.

The Patrol Division will focus on the following areas:

- Curfew violations
- Underage drinking
- Driver's license and insurance checkpoints
- Burglary patrols based on up-to-date crime statistics
- Bar checks
- Graffiti patrols and cleanup efforts
- Assist with sex offender, parole and probation checks
- Speed enforcement
- Distracted driver enforcement
- DWI enforcement
- Illegal parking enforcement
