After much fanfare and perhaps the largest mound of dirt any of us have ever seen, COSTCO is open! The Market at Olive development is officially underway and just down the road, at North and South Road and Olive, you can begin to see the outlines of a QuikTrip being constructed. Progress on Olive is evident.

There is certainly still work to do (I am under no illusions about that) but things are moving in the right direction. Tribute to Paulette Carr (1948 - 2022)

University City mourns the loss of Paulette Carr, former Council Member for Ward 2 and tireless advocate for economic development. In addition to serving on the City Council from 2012 until 2020, she led the drive for the first state audit of University City, initiated a stormwater task force, served on the City Plan Commission and championed economic development. In 2017, she alongside Bwayne Smotherson (Ward 3) and subsequently, Steve McMahon (Ward 1) spearheaded a Council study session that resulted in issuing a request for proposals for a developer to assemble land and reinvest in the Third Ward at Olive and I-170. As a result of her vision, the new Costco Wholesale store opened last October and the Market at Olive is under development.

Paulette was a resident of the City for more than three decades before moving to Holland, Mich., where she lost her courageous 18-month battle with cancer. She passed away on Dec. 20, 2022 at age 74. She is survived by her husband, Jim, son J. Peyton Carr (Michelle), sisters Diane Yang (Tom) and Sondra Goodman (John), brother-in-law Tom Carr (Nina Ganci) and niece Allyson Barnes. Memorial contributions can be made to Grace Episcopal Church or Hospice of Holland, both of Holland, Mich.

In 1923, University City opened its earliest parks. Lewis, Heman, Flynn and Eastgate Parks debuted. In addition, a plan was made to name parks for mayors as parks developed and mayors retired.

Today, there are more than a dozen developed parks offering activities for everyone to stroll, roll, play, picnic, relax, enjoy sports and the arts, and to simply come together as a community.

Celebrating the past, present and future began this year with the distribution of the 2023 U City Calendar featuring photos of our parks.

Walk into the Woods!



One of University City's most unique and underutilized parks is Ruth Park Woods, a 26-acre urban forest of mixed hardwoods situated on the northern edge of Ruth Park Golf Course. But like a beautiful princess that is held captive in fairy tales, Ruth Park Woods has been held captive by non-native honeysuckles, winter creeper vine and other invasive species.

Thanks to a multi-year project begun in 2021 by U City in Bloom, the City of University City and the Green Center and NatureScapers, Ruth Park Woods is being reclaimed with impressive results. Trees have been freed from choking vines, wildflowers and wildlife are returning and a 1.2-mile loop trail passes through shady groves and a beautiful wetlands area.

Make plans now to explore Ruth Park Woods as part of the Centennial celebration of University City Parks. Guided tours of the woodlands will be led on Saturday, Apr. 15 and Sunday, Apr. 16. Times and more information will be posted on ucityinbloom.org.

Centennial Commons and Heman Park Pool Update

As you may be aware, the flood heavily damaged many of our City facilities and equipment. Centennial Commons has more than \$1M in restoration and repairs needed. The electrical system, gym floor and the weight room need to be repaired or replaced, new drywall and flooring is needed throughout and more.

The Heman Park Pool also faced significant damage including damage to its electrical systems, pump and front entry.

Overall, our facilities and equipment experienced more than \$18M in damage. We have been working with St. Louis County, FEMA, SEMA and our insurance company to recoup funds to make these repairs in an expedient manner to get you back to enjoying your favorite U City facilities.

We are in the process of bidding work to repair these areas in addition to the baseball field and dog park. As soon as more updates and reopening timelines are available, information will be shared at ucitymo.org and on our social media pages.

The City encourages and appreciates timely payment of fees assessed for each property. Various payment options are available including:



Online Payments: eUtilities is a free online service that allows residents to view their solid waste account activity, make payments and receive an email to view billing statements. To sign up, go to ucitymo.org and choose the **Online Bill Pay** icon on the left side, which will redirect you to the Online Bill Pay (eUtilities) screen. Follow the steps to setup a new or existing account. If you have difficulty logging into your account or have questions about how to navigate the system, please contact the Finance Department at 314.505.8544. The system only allows for payments using a debit or credit card with a Visa or MasterCard logo.

Electronic Funds Transfer (Bank Drafting): The Electronic Funds Transfer program for solid waste billing allows solid payments to be automatically debited from your account five business days before the due date and applied directly to your solid waste bill. To choose the Electronic Funds Transfer, please contact the Finance Department at 314.505.8544 for further assistance.

Cash, Check and Charge: Solid waste bills can be paid by cash, check and debit or credit card. Cash must be paid in person at the Finance Department, checks can be paid either in person or regular mail and credit card payments are accepted either in person or via phone by contacting the Finance Department mainline at 314.505.8544. The City only accepts Visa and MasterCard. There is no convenience fee charge for debit or credit card payment processing.

Annual Billing for Solid Waste Services Begins March 1

March 1 is the first billing date for solid waste (refuse) services, including trash, recycling, yard waste and bulk item collection. All services are billed in advance and statements are issued by the Finance Department in six month cycles. (See table.)

Solid waste fees not paid 30 days after the beginning of the service period for which the bill is issued shall be considered delinquent or past due. See table.

Senior citizens living in single or two-family houses may be eligible for a discount on solid waste services if they meet the following conditions:

- At least one resident of the property must be at least 65 years of age
- No more than two people living in the housing unit (*number of occupants listed on application will be checked against occupancy permit*)
- Resident must agree to accept a smaller trash receptacle if you have a roll-out cart (60 gallon).

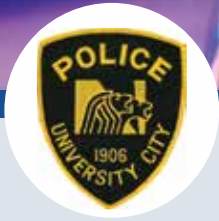


U City in Bloom Plant Sale: April 29 – 30

University City Police Department Crime Tips and Notifications

The University City Police Department (UCPD) has been utilizing a multi-layered approach to receiving and processing crime tips and information. Whether an individual prefers to remain anonymous or is simply passing on helpful information, UCPD genuinely appreciates all useful information.

Often, UCPD personnel must thoroughly verify the information being received by citizens, non-citizens, community partners and others before formulating strategic plans to curb the allegations.

UCPD can act on anonymous tips based on the following rules, laws and procedures that have been developed in accordance with the U.S. Constitution. Police contact with individuals usually occurs:

- on public streets,
- in motor vehicles, or
- in homes or other buildings.

Under appropriate circumstances a UCPD police officer may approach an individual for purposes of investigating probable criminal behavior. An investigative detention without a warrant must be based on a reasonable suspicion such as:

- an activity out of the ordinary has taken place,
- the activity is related to crime, or
- the person detained is involved in the activity.

VALIDATION FOR THE STOP OR DETENTION BY POLICE MUST INCLUDE ONE OR MORE OF THE FOLLOWING:

- precise and articulable facts that support the police intrusion or
- consideration of the totality of circumstances.

IF POLICE ARE ACTING ON AN ANONYMOUS TIP, COURTS WILL CONSIDER WHETHER:

- police have confirmed or verified information or
- if the information is exact and/or reliable.

We'll be moving back into our permanent location at 6701 Delmar Blvd. after more than a year in our temporary location at 6900 Delmar Blvd. Construction is on track to finish in March and we look forward to welcoming the community back soon after.

While the bulk of the work has been upgrading outdated systems, including electrical, HVAC and plumbing, the renovated building will have more meeting room space, new bathrooms, new technology makerspace and an expanded area for young readers.

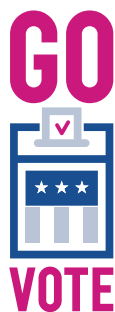

Be Weather Aware and Sign Up Today for CodeRed Early Warning Alerts

Spring is coming and that also means rain is coming. Hopefully, there will be enough rainfall to make the grass and flowers beautiful but not cause flooding.

The University City Stormwater Commission has worked hard getting the new CodeRed early warning system perfected and available online for residents, as well as providing the most accurate and up-to-date flood maps to the University City police and fire departments.

The fire department also has linked the flood mapping information to CodeRed to send accurate alerts to those at risk. With CodeRed, first responders can alert the community quickly about any potential flooding, allowing residents extra time to evacuate or take other necessary actions.

Residents can do their part to help the police and fire departments be more effective by downloading and signing up for CodeRed. Signing up ensures residents will have peace of mind knowing that the Stormwater Commission, police and fire departments and the City are looking out for their safety and well-being.

It is important to be aware that while CodeRed can send out both emergency and non-emergency communications about University City, CodeRed also offers at the same time national weather service alerts that cover the entire metropolitan region.

Be careful to check each alert because *only* CodeRed alerts from University City provide specific information about your distinct location.
