Work Underway on Annex and Trinity Building Renovations

Following a groundbreaking ceremony August 1, work has begun on preparing the Annex and Trinity Buildings to be renovated into a state-of-the-art Police Department and Municipal Courts Building, respectively. Midwest Services Group is currently conducting abatement and asbestos removal starting with the Trinity building. Abatement on both buildings will be completed by the end of the year when general contractor, ICS Construction Services, Ltd., will begin construction. The anticipated completion date for both buildings is March 2026.

Trinity, built in 1934, is a two-story, 8,512-sq.ft. building that was used as the University City Public Library for nearly six decades until the 1960s. The Annex, built in 1903, is a three-story plus basement, nearly 36,000-sq.-ft. property that served as the Police Department headquarters for nearly eight decades until 2016, when it was condemned, resulting in the Department's relocation to temporary trailers on the parking lot behind City Hall.

The active construction site will impact parking at City Hall and Municipal Lot 4 will be used for overflow parking. There is no cost to park in Municipal Lot 4.

Bike the Parks and Gardens Sun., Oct. 13

U City in Bloom, the City of University City and Great Rivers Greenways will host the second annual "Ride the Parks and Gardens" family-friendly bike ride on Sun., Oct. 13, at 10 a.m., beginning and ending at Centennial Commons west parking lot in front of the pool entrance. Donations are welcome to support this free and fun event.

The 2024 route plans to follow a proposed Centennial Greenway connecting Heman Park to the existing Centennial Greenway running along I-170. The ride will highlight University City Parks and U City in Bloom gardens in the western half of University City. We will explore the way this new path will create a safe walking/biking/strolling route through our community. Eventually these new pathways will connect to existing Centennial Greenways, providing a seamless trail from Forest Park to Creve Coeur Lake Memorial Park.



Update from St. Louis County & Great Rivers Greenway!

St. Louis County is beginning the design phase of the proposed Vernon Road reconstruction and extension of Centennial Greenway from Ackert Walkway to Heman Park along Vernon Rd. In partnership with Great Rivers Greenway, this project will create a greenway trail separate from car traffic for people to walk, ride a bike, push a stroller or roll a wheelchair.

University City Library to Present Music, Author Events and Craft Classes This Fall

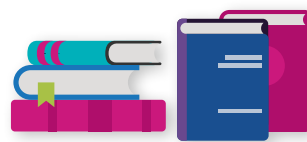

September also features in-person events with three authors. Both events are intended for adults, but are free and open to all, and will take place in the auditorium.

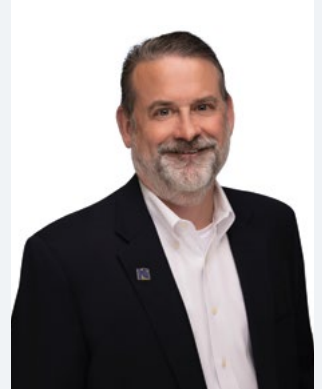

It has been an honor to serve the City and the First Ward for nearly eight years. I am proud of the accomplishments of this administration during that time. - Hiring a professional City Manager who is a respected member of the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) and admired by neighboring municipalities

Construction to Begin on LOCAL University City Mixed-Use Development

Construction is expected to begin in fall 2024 for the new LOCAL University City mixed-use development in the 6600 block of the Delmar Loop, on the former site of Craft Alliance and Commerce Bank. The development is a welcome addition to the western end of the historic commercial district, near Vintage Vinyl, Corner 17, Fitz's and other beloved local businesses.

The final plan, approved by the City Council in May 2024, is slightly modified from the original announced in December 2023.

The nearly two-acre project is being developed by Subtext, LLC, and will feature a total of 259 residential units. In addition to 249 studio, one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments, there will be 10 two-story, two-bedroom townhomes with stoops on the ground floor facing Delmar, as well as 7,100-sq.-ft. of new ground-floor commercial space for restaurants, retail and banking. The development will also feature a 399 space parking garage accessed from Loop South with 339 spaces reserved for residents and 60 spaces allocated for public parking for commercial tenants' customers.

Fall Bulk Residential Household Item Collection

Want to get rid of old furniture, rugs, mattresses, carpet or broken appliances? Residential households can place curbside three large items or up to seven smaller household items for the annual fall bulk pick-up.

ITEMS ACCEPTED - furniture, bedding, cabinets, doors, windows (all glass must be wrapped in cardboard), rugs, carpet, mattresses, box springs, washers and dryers, refrigerators (doors removed), small air conditioners, sinks and toilets.

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED - televisions and computer monitors, hazardous materials, commercial items, business equipment, yard waste, tree trunks, logs, building or construction type debris and materials, tires, auto batteries, motors, railroad ties, barrel drums, concrete bricks, landscape stones, boulders, rocks, dirt, roofing materials, siding, fluorescent tubes and household trash.

All acceptable items must be placed at the front curb (not an alley) by the Sunday night before collection begins in the area. Trucks are in each area collecting items during the entire week and make only one pass on each street. Please be sure that items are not blocked by parked vehicles. Holiday Schedule for Trash and Recycling Collection



Labor Day - No trash/recycling collection on Mon., Sept. 2 due to the Labor Day holiday. All trash/recycling routes during the week of Sept. 2 will be collected the day AFTER your normal collection day. Monday routes will be collected Tuesday, Tuesday routes collected Wednesday, Wednesday routes collected Thursday, Thursday routes collected Friday, and Friday routes collected Saturday. Regular trash and recycling collection will resume on Mon., Sept. 9.

Thanksgiving Day and Day After - No trash/recycling collection on Thurs., Nov. 28. Thursday routes will be collected on Friday, and Friday routes will be collected on Saturday. Regular collection will resume Mon., Dec. 2.

Fall Leaf Collection Dates

University City fall leaf collection crews will begin collecting leaves from the front curb of residential properties in November. Leaves must be raked to the curb line by Sunday, the day before collection begins in each area.

Crews will only make one pass on each street during the collection week, so leaves must be raked to the curb before the scheduled collection week begins in your area. Leaves placed after the scheduled collection dates are the responsibility of the property owner to remove.

Every effort will be made to maintain the schedule, but residents should be prepared for delays due to inclement weather.

TIPS:

- Make sure parked vehicles do not block access to leaves
- Rake leaves to top of curb
- Place leaves in open, unobstructed area
- Keep piles long and narrow
- Remove rocks, bricks, glass, yard waste or other hard materials. Any piles containing debris will be passed.

Only LEAVES will be collected. Yard waste will NOT be collected, including gumballs, trash, small tree branches or limbs, brush and grass clippings. Do not rake leaves into the street or onto sidewalks. Leaves that are not in the street and raked to top of curb will be passed.

The leaf vacuuming and collection process will create dust and a small amount of leaf debris. University City is not responsible for dust on vehicles or other personal property. For more information, please contact the Department of Public Works at 314.505.8560.

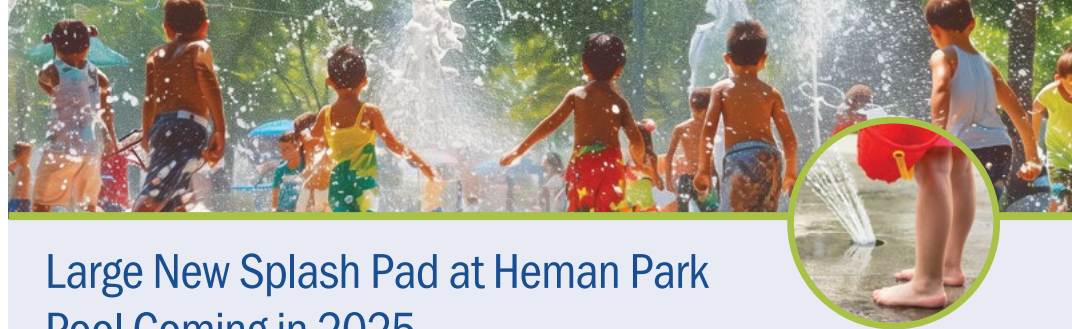
Puppy Pool Party

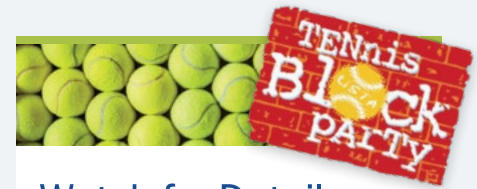

University City Scores a Home Run with New Jack Buck Youth Baseball and Softball Field

University City residents can now cheer on their young athletes at the rejuvenated Jack Buck Field. A significant win-win for the community's youth sports programs and Heman Park, the new state-of-the-art facility, named for the iconic St. Louis Cardinals broadcaster, held its inaugural game last June.

The original Jack Buck Field was destroyed in the 2022 summer flood. Although the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) declared the baseball outfield unfit for repairs because of its location in a floodplain, they provided support for University City to not only rebuild the field but also to significantly upgrade it to meet professional standards for high school softball and ages 11 and under baseball.

Updated features include precise field dimensions, new infield soil and outfield sod, a regulation warning track, and a perfectly positioned pitcher's surface and home plate. These enhancements reflect University City's commitment to providing top facilities for young athletes.

This fantastic addition to Heman Park is a major attraction for baseball and softball enthusiasts. The well-maintained field offers a safe space for young athletes to hone their competitive skills while serving as a community hub for fostering shared memories and celebrating a love for sports.



Millar Park Baseball Field Gets Major League Makeover

The City of University City and the University City High School Lions baseball team will soon be able to roar to victory thanks to a \$575,000 grant to transform the east baseball field at Millar Park into a state-of-the-art high school regulation baseball diamond. The upgraded facility will provide the City's recreation and high school teams with a top-notch field to call home.

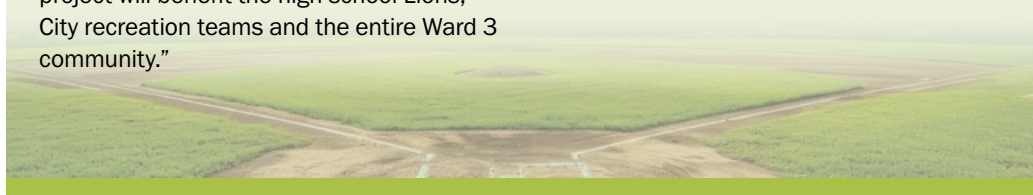
This exciting news comes after the devastating summer 2022 floods that destroyed the original Jack Buck Field in Heman Park, making it unplayable and unfit for refurbishment for high school regulation baseball due to floodplain concerns raised by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

"We are thrilled to bring high school regulation baseball to Millar Park," said Darin Girdler, Director of Parks, Recreation and Forestry for University City. "Thanks to the Municipal Park Grant Commission, this project will benefit the high school Lions, City recreation teams and the entire Ward 3 community."

Construction began in late summer and will take several months, including additional time needed for the new soil to settle over the winter. Extensive improvements worth the wait include the following:

- Professional Standards: The field will be completely overhauled to meet exact high school regulation baseball field dimensions.
- Field of Dreams: Upgrades will include new, high-quality soil, a warning track and precise positioning for the pitcher's mound and home plate.

The grant is a "home run" for everyone. When the Lions baseball season begins in spring 2025, Millar Park will be buzzing with the excitement of a modern regulation baseball facility for high school teams and youth leagues. The upgrade will not only enhance a cherished community park, but also foster school spirit and community pride.





Weatherproof Policing

The University City Police Department (UCPD) ensures effective policing in all weather conditions. Unlike some professions, law enforcement cannot take time off during severe heat, extreme cold, heavy rain or other harsh weather. Effective 21st-century policing requires innovation, commitment, heart, emotional intelligence and professional resilience regardless of the weather.

Unfortunately, criminals sometimes exploit extreme conditions, believing they can evade arrest. For example, extreme heat can lead to more disturbances, fights and violent crimes, affecting everyone's tolerance levels. UCPD stays prepared to address these issues in daily roll call meetings, adjusting strategies and increasing patrols for weather-related crime spikes, such as vandalism, robberies, weapon related crimes or car thefts.

Adverse weather can also hinder officers' visibility, movement and impact technology. Devices like drones, surveillance cameras, computers and robots can malfunction in extreme temperatures. Police canines (K9s) also face challenges, so UCPD personnel and canines train bi-weekly for all weather conditions.

UCPD focuses on being prepared year-round with equipment, uniforms and resources to ensure safety for employees and the public. Effective policing techniques include increasing patrol deterrents, leveraging technology like GPS and dash cameras, and engaging with the community. Proactive measures ensure that businesses, residential areas, parks, schools, religious institutions and other venues receive adequate attention.

A central focus of UCPD's preparation includes prioritizing clear communication with personnel before and during severe weather events. This involves developing well-formulated response plans, including technology like the City's CodeRED system for digital and audible notifications and Next Generation 911 (NG911) for improved communication during crises. UCPD also regularly collaborates with groups like the Red Cross of St. Louis and the United Way to ensure preparedness for disasters or urgent events.

Seasonal weather changes can significantly affect behavior and police strategy, but UCPD officers are trained to handle all elements, ensuring the community's safety year-round.

Fire Safety Gears Up for Fire Prevention Week: Oct. 7-12

Throughout the year, the University City Fire Department (UCFD) conducts community fire inspections, fire extinguisher training and building walkthroughs to enhance safety. While inspections help identify fire hazards and enforce building codes, the walkthroughs familiarize crews with building layouts, suppression devices, alarm systems, construction and fire tactics. Fire extinguisher training educates employees on proper extinguisher use.

The UCFD is preparing for the fall season with various fire prevention activities. Each October, the UCFD schedules its annual Fire Prevention Week activities, joining fire departments nationwide to promote fire safety. This year, from October 7-12, UCFD will visit all University City elementary schools to discuss fire safety with children, sharing this year's National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) theme, "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!" Presentations will emphasize the importance of smoke alarms, their proper location and operation.

Research supports that working smoke detectors reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by 54 percent, while three out of five fire deaths result from non-functioning or absent smoke detectors. Families and the community can support fire prevention by educating themselves and others about smoke detectors. Key points from the NFPA include:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on each level of the home, including the basement.
- Regularly test your smoke alarm detectors, replace them every 10 years or if they fail to respond to testing, and change the batteries every six months.
- Ensure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Test smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button.

The UCFD offers programs to help obtain and install smoke detectors and collaborates with the American Red Cross to provide smoke alarms for the hearing impaired. For more information, contact the UCFD at 314.505.8768.

What is the Sutter Meyer Farmhouse?

The Sutter-Meyer Farmhouse, the small white-painted brick house at 6826 Chamberlain Court, is believed to be the oldest building in University City, probably built around 1873.

The farmhouse is on land once owned by John Sutter, who was born in Germany in 1815 and came to St. Louis with his family in 1831. Sutter operated a dairy farm on about 120 acres bounded by the modern streets of Sutter, Etzel, Pennsylvania Avenues, and Olive Blvd.

William Sutter, the second child, received 8.33 acres from his father. He and his wife mortgaged their small farm in 1873 and may have used that money to build what we know today as the Sutter-Meyer Farmhouse. In 1875, they sold their farm to Roman Meyer. For the next three generations the Meyer family operated a produce farm on this land and they lived in the farmhouse for four generations.

The City of University City now owns this historic farmhouse and adjacent land to the east. It is leased by the Sutter-Meyer Society, which formed in 2006 to preserve and maintain this University City treasure, extending its legacy with historical exhibits and educational programs.
