Lifeguard Certification Class Available– Ages 16 & up!

Are you a strong swimmer who wants to become a lifeguard? Then sign up for our American Red Cross Lifeguard certification course. All lifeguard candidates must pass pre-requisites before enrolling in the class:

- ⇒ Minimum age of 16 by the start of the class date.
- ⇒ Swim 300 yards continuously, using the following strokes with rhythmic breathing: 100 yards front crawl, 100 breaststroke, 100 yards either front crawl or breaststroke.
- ⇒ Perform "Brick" test in 100 seconds or less: enter water, swim 20 yards, surface dive 7-10 ft. and retrieve a 10 lb. brick, return to surface, swim 20 yards back to starting point with both hands on brick, exit water.

What are expenditures?

Expenditures represent the money the City pays to obtain goods and services, ranging from fire trucks and street repairs to employee salaries.

Funds, Explained

The General Fund is referred to as the "operating budget." The other funds are used for non-operating or specific, restricted revenue sources.

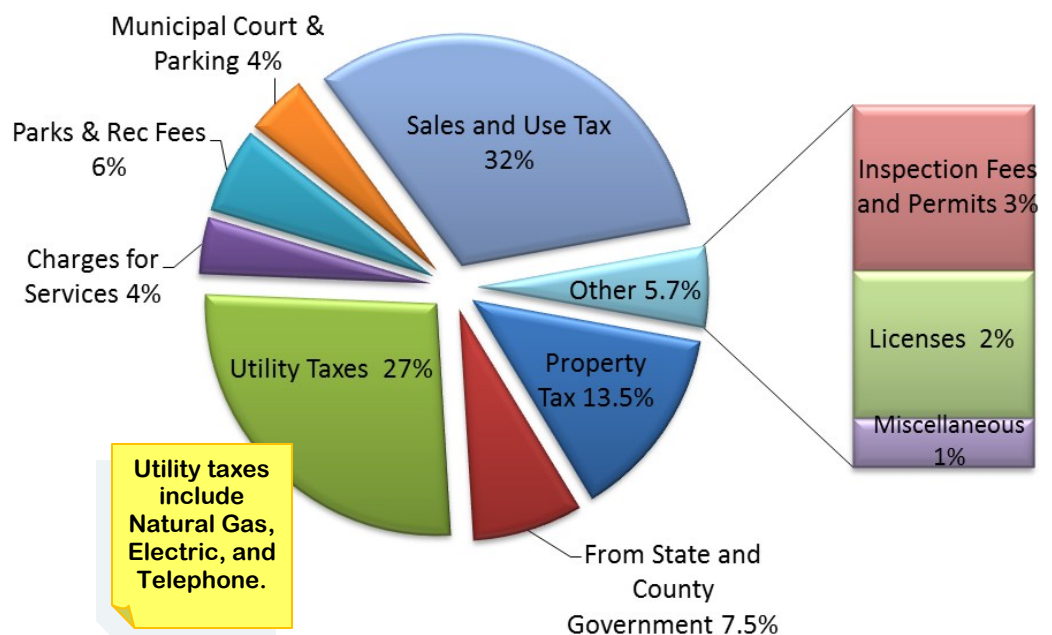
Fiscal Year 2012-2013 Proposed Budget Overview

The City Manager is pleased to share the Fiscal Year 2013 (FY 13) proposed (draft) budget. FY 13 is from July 1, 2012, through June 30, 2013. In this newsletter you will find an overview of city revenues and expenses, followed by a discussion of budget highlights, and challenges we face to ensure expenses are not greater than revenue.

University City must spend its money on essential items and services, just like you do for yourself and your household. We both have to live within our means, and it's a constant balancing act. The budget for Fiscal Year 2013 (FY 13) is balanced with expenditures not exceeding revenues. It is important to ensure the city does not spend more money than it receives, and to spend taxpayer money wisely and prudently.

The City has 13 separate funds. The General Fund is the largest account and supports general city operations including public safety (police and fire services); infrastructure improvement; recreational, cultural, and social services; and city administration. The General Fund receives income or "revenue" from many sources. The primary source of revenue is taxes, including Sales Tax at 32% of total revenues, followed by Utility Taxes (27%), and Property Tax (13.5%). See pie chart below.

General Fund Revenues

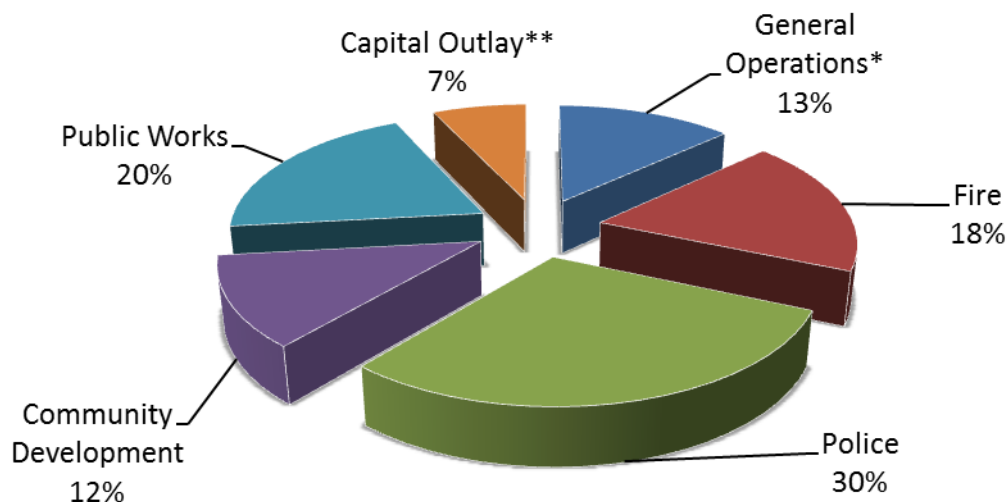

The budget sets spending limits for the programs and services that reflect the priorities of University City citizens. It also serves as a work plan and a financial plan. The General Fund accounts for about 60% of the City's total expenditures (\$25.7 million) with the majority of expenditures dedicated to public safety, (police and fire services) at 48%.

What is capital outlay?

Capital projects generally involve the construction, purchase, or renovation of buildings, parks, streets, or other physical structures.

The Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is a schedule of capital improvements needed within the City. It provides a plan to accomplish those needs within the city's ability to pay.

Proposed Budget by the Numbers

Total Budget:	\$ 44.1 million

Budget Increase from FY 2012:	13.4%

The budget increase from FY 12 is because of a higher capital budget this year. About 56% of the increase comes from grant revenue. These projects had been delayed from previous years due to reduced revenue sources, because of the recession.

What is the "Proposed Budget?"

The proposed budget for FY 2013 was presented to City Council on February 27, 2012 by the City Manager.

To develop the proposed budget, the City Manager and Finance Department worked with all city departments to develop revenue and expenditure estimates for the upcoming fiscal year.

This budget is **not final**. City Council members and U City residents have opportunities to give feedback during budget study sessions and public budget meetings.

Budget Highlights

1. **No reduction in City services-** University City will continue to provide the current level of services to residents. There will be no reductions in services, including Police and Fire.
2. **Increased funding for Police & Fire operations-** Safety is a top priority in University City. There is an increase in funding to ensure the highest quality Police and Fire services.
3. **No increases for real estate taxes or sales tax revenue-** Taxes are necessary to provide the city services residents depend on. We carefully calculate the City's needs to ensure residents are not paying any more than is necessary.
4. **No cost of living increases for employees for the fourth year-** Our employees work hard and continue to do more with less. To keep budget costs down, there is no proposed cost of living increase for employee salaries.
5. **New partnership with the University City School District to share the cost of a dedicated grant writer-** We are always seeking outside funding sources to help reduce the burden of necessary expenses. A dedicated grant writer's expertise will help our City gain outside financial assistance for various projects.
6. **Increased funding for U City In Bloom-** The budget proposes a small increase to maintain our beautiful city.
7. **Funding for City Hall Summer Youth Program for the second year-** This program provides youth ages 16-19 with meaningful work experience and enhances their job skills.



What are the main challenges in creating a balanced budget?

1. **Declining population-** City population has declined 5.5% from the 2000 to 2010 census (from 37,500 to 35,400). This decline has a negative impact on tax revenue.
2. **Potential sales tax changes-** There are proposals to change U City from a “pool” city to a “point-of-sale” city, which would decrease the amount of sales tax revenue U City collects. As a pool city, we share sales tax revenue with other pool cities and unincorporated County areas. A sliding scale calculates how much each area shares. If we switched to a point-of-sale city, we would only retain sales tax revenues collected from businesses located within our city.
3. **Tree maintenance-** U City has thousands of trees which require trimming and other maintenance. This is a significant expense, but necessary for resident safety.
4. **Aging infrastructure-** As an older suburb, University City has considerable needs for street, sidewalk, and curb repair. There is a street paving backlog that must be addressed, in addition to annual routine maintenance. Sidewalks and curbs must be updated to comply with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessibility standards. Plus, sidewalks and curbs must also keep up with annual maintenance.

NEW University City Chamber of Commerce

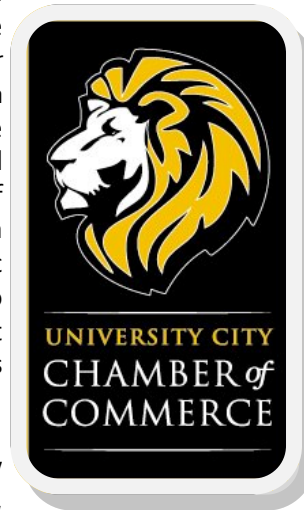
October 2011 marked the rebirth of the University City Chamber of Commerce. Since early 2011, a number of dedicated and committed volunteers and business owners, with the seed money provided by the City and assistance by City staff, have begun working towards re-establishing the Chamber which had been defunct for many years. The Chamber provides a recognized, efficient and legitimate forum for exchanging ideas and addressing the business needs of University City as a whole. This action is consistent with the strategic initiatives in economic development to implement an economic development organization, as outlined in the City's latest Comprehensive Plan Update.

Since the formation of the new University City Chamber of Commerce, City staff has been working closely with the Chamber Board of Directors in its outreach and programming efforts. Together we would like to create a supportive environment for our local businesses by helping them grow and encouraging

new businesses to choose University City as their destination.

The Chamber holds a different type of meeting every week of the month. The first week there is a general membership meeting that rotates between breakfast, lunch and happy hours. The second week there is a "brown bag" lunch meeting where a member business is scheduled to present to other members on the nature of their business. The Board of Directors meets in an open meeting during the third week of the month. In the fourth week, there is a coffee event at Jilly's Cupcakes to meet and network with other businesses before work in the morning.

Technical Assistance for Sustainability Awarded by U.S. EPA

University City is the only city in the St. Louis region, and among the 56 communities across the nation, awarded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with technical assistance through the Building Blocks for Sustainable Communities program in 2012.

Building Blocks is a project of the Partnership for Sustainable Communities, involving EPA, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ([HUD](#)), and the U.S. Department of Transportation ([DOT](#)). The award announcement was made in early February at the New Partners for Smart Growth Conference held in San Diego, CA.

“The Building Blocks for Sustainable Communities program allows EPA, in partnership with other federal agencies, to provide technical assistance so communities can realize their vision of a sustainable

future,” said Karl Brooks, EPA Region 7 Administrator. “I applaud University City for setting an example in sustainability for other communities to follow.”

The [EPA](#) awarded University City a Sustainable Land Use Audit Workshop for later this year. The day-long community workshop will identify ways to improve the city’s zoning code to incorporate sustainability. The Sustainable Land Use Audit will build upon existing planning efforts to coordinate transportation linkages, energy efficiency, affordable housing, neighborhood walkability and overall sustainable practices. The city will receive a short “next steps” memo outlining options to consider as it moves forward to improve the economy, the environment, and quality of life.

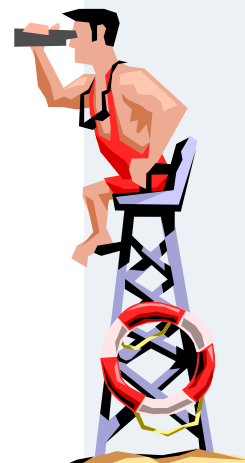

Scholarship Program Available for U City Residents

Everyone should have the opportunity to improve their quality of life through recreation facilities and programs. To help meet this goal, the Department of Community Development – Recreation Division offers a recreation scholarship to income-qualified University City residents. Funding is limited.

The scholarship award amount will be based on all household income sources, including related and unrelated people residing in a household. Individual and family scholarships are available. Scholarships are provided at a sliding scale, dependent on income, at a discounted rate of 25%, 50%, or 75% of the program's adopted fee.

Scholarships are available for the following:

- Youth before and after school programs, and city operated full day recreation programs (i.e. Summer Youth Recreation Program, etc.)
- Fitness and/or Leisure education classes. Lessons and senior social activities will be limited to two (2) per person per fiscal quarter (July 1-Sept 30, Oct 1-Dec 31, Jan 1-Mar 31, Apr 1-June 30)
- Centennial Commons memberships and Heman Pool/Natatorium Swim Passes
- University City Sports Association or University City Soccer Club youth sports player fees

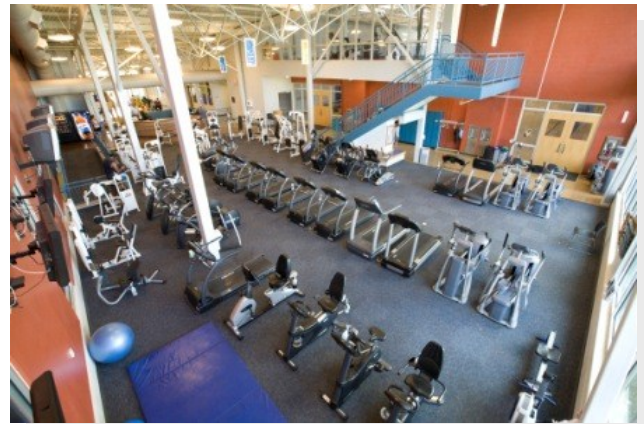

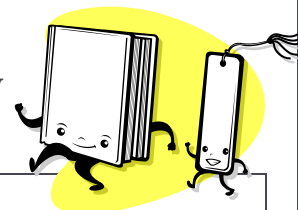

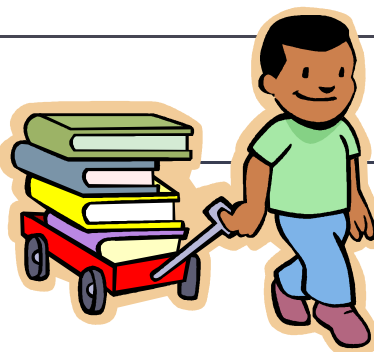
